

Gene Griffin, J.D., Ph.D., is a clinical psychologist and attorney. He presently serves as an assistant professor in the Department of Psychiatry at Northwestern University's Feinberg School of Medicine in Chicago, where he is co-director of a project funded by the National Child Traumatic Stress Network.

Gene is currently collaborating with experts from the MacArthur Foundation's Models for Change project in developing a curriculum for juvenile justice staff regarding adolescent development, mental illness and trauma. He is also a member of the American Psychological Association's Committee on Legal Issues and a Fellow of the Child Trauma Academy in Houston, Texas. In Illinois, Gene is a Commissioner on the Illinois Juvenile Justice Commission and the Clinical Director of the Illinois Childhood Trauma Coalition.

Previously, Gene worked as an assistant public defender in Cook County Juvenile Court. As a clinical psychologist, he has been a unit chief of both short-term and long-term inpatient psychiatric adolescent units. Gene has worked with the Illinois Division of Mental Health, where he helped develop the Mental Health Juvenile Justice Initiative. Gene has also worked with the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services where he helped develop its Child Trauma Program.

Gene obtained both his law degree and his doctorate in clinical psychology from Northwestern University. He completed an internship in clinical and forensic psychology through Harvard Medical School.
